# Council votes to oppose solar planning application for Colbinabbin

Campaspe Shire Council has agreed to formally oppose the planning application for the Cooba Solar Farm at Colbinabbin, citing significant concerns regarding its impact on agricultural land and the local environment.

Canadian developer Venn Energy proposes to build the 500 megawatt solar farm and 300 MW battery at Colbinabbin which would be located at 4.5 km south of the town.

The fight against the 665-hectare project, has become increasingly controversial with local farmers and residents citing a flawed consultation process and impact assessments.

Colbinabbin Renewable Action Group (C.R.A.G.) members claim there are fourteen homes within a 1 km radius of the proposed site while only six neighbours have been included in the consultation process.

The group outlines a range of objections, noting the loss of prime agricultural land from production, the visual impact of 700,000 panels and potential detrimental impact on neighbouring vineyards.

It believes there have been critical research gaps in the planning process, including a lack of soil testing on prime agricultural land, flawed flood modelling, and no comprehensive assessment of impact on the wine region microclimate.

Concern in the community has grown over the past year, leading to an online petition against the project and a call for supporters to lodge objections to the Victorian Planning Minister calling for a rejection of the application.

"This isn't about opposing renewable energy - it's about protecting prime agricultural land and ensuring proper process. The assessment work simply isn't up to standard," a local wine producer said.

Campaspe Shire Mayor Cr Daniel Mackrell noted that Council's submission will argue that the project does not align with the strategic planning context and fails to demonstrate strong economic community benefits, particularly in relation to job creation and procurement.

"Whilst we fully support solar energy facilities in suitable locations, we feel that

the Cooba Solar Farm's proposed site and unresolved issues make it an unsuitable choice.

"Council has been advocating against this location for many months and provided supporting information to all members of the Legislative Council during its regional sitting in April in Echuca," Mayor Mackrell added.

Council's review, supported by independent technical experts, found the proposal contrary to the Campaspe Planning Scheme and the Solar Energy Facilities Design and Development Guideline. Key concerns include the loss of productive agricultural land, inadequate soil surveys, and insufficient information on decommissioning and land restoration.

Council meeting recommends that the Minister for Planning reject the Cooba Solar Farm planning application due to its potential negative impact on agricultural land and the local environment.

Councillors also requested that Council officers write to the proponent requesting the project be referred to the Commonwealth Government Environment Minister to determine if the project is a controlled action under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act (1999).

# Get into the swim - use your local pool

Free regular entry is again being provided this summer to the Colbinabbin, Kyabram, Lockington, Rushworth, Stanhope and Tongala outdoor pools – just in time for what is tipped to be a hot summer.

Free season passes are available via the Council's website. Simply create or log in to your account to register for a free season pass, which will be valid at all Campaspe Shire outdoor pools for the duration of the season.

Director Communities Jo Bradshaw said this was a fantastic initiative that promoted opportunities for relaxation and recreation in the warmer months.

"Coming into summer, we are delighted to again provide free pool access for the community.

"The outdoor pools offer the chance for residents and visitors to enjoy the beautiful weather in our region."

The outdoor pool season has commenced and will continue until Monday 10 March 2025. During school terms Campaspe Shire's outdoor pools are open from 4pm to 8pm weekdays and from 1pm to 8pm on weekends. During school holidays the pools are open from 1pm to 8pm every day except Christmas Day.

#### **Bush Nippers**

Campaspe Shire Council is also running its annual Bush Nippers river safety program for children aged 5 to 14 years.

Bush Nippers is a regional and rural inland adaptation to the coastal nipper education programs. It is designed to educate young swimmers about river safety and offer water safety knowledge and lifesaving skills in open water environments.

Greater Shepparton City Council also provides a number of seasonally opened rural outdoor pools, including Murchison Swimming Pool and Tatura Swimming Complex, operating during the summer season from early-December to mid-March each year.

The Murchison Swimming Pool is a community run pool with volunteers organising its regular opening to the public as well as a calendar of events and activities.

The 2024-2025 season runs from Saturday 30 November 2024 until Monday 10 March 2025. Opening times are 3.30pm to 6.00pm Monday to Friday during School Terms. Weekends and School Holidays are 1.00pm to 6.00pm.

If the temperature is forecast to be 24°C or

below, the outdoor pools will be closed. When the temperature is forecast to be 38°C and above, the pool opening hours will be extended.



# Safety first when decorating at Christmas

It's that time of year again when Victorians string up their Christmas lights and set up their Christmas trees to celebrate the holiday season, but with the fun and festivities comes the potential for serious fire hazards. CFA and FRV are urging Victorians to check their Christmas lights before use to ensure they bring nothing but cheer this Christmas.

Using damaged lights alongside tinsel and paper on Christmas trees can present a fire risk. CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan urged everyone using Christmas lights to thoroughly inspect them for damage before hanging them on their trees and homes.

"Christmas lights are a wonderful way to brighten up Christmas but use year after year can result in frayed wires, damaged bulbs, and other wear and tear that makes them unsafe for the tree or your home," Jason said.

"Turn your lights off before you go to sleep or leave the house to ensure they don't overheat and consider using battery operated or solar lights that don't require electricity."

Fire Rescue Victoria Deputy Commissioner Community Safety Joshua Fischer said it was also important to closely check and monitor any decorations containing a lithium-ion battery.

"Lithium-ion battery powered decorations and appliances have become increasingly popular, and we just want to ensure everyone is using them as safely as possible," Joshua said.

"Only buy products from reputable suppliers, use the charging cords supplied with the device and only charge items outdoors or in rooms with a smoke alarm."

Christmas fire safety tips:

• When buying Christmas lights, make sure they have the Regulatory Compliance Mark tick of approval

• Consider using batteryoperated LED or solar lights which don't require electricity.

• Inspect your Christmas lights for any sign of damage or wear and tear. Make sure there's no exposed wiring and that there are no missing globes.

• Don't overload power boards; use no more than three sets of lights per power board, even if there are



four or more outlets on it, and avoid using double adaptors.

• Place your tree as far as possible from any heat source, curtains or furnishings.

#### Greetings and welcome to your local police report for the Rushworth Police Service Area, for the month of November 2024.

The CFA website is great for information about this. Operation Roadwise begins on 13/12/24. All operational police units will begin conducting daily breath and drug testing sites, as well as speed enforcement during every shift. It goes without saying if you are planning to go out for a few drinks, don't drive home. Even a short distance is no excuse for putting everyone's safety at risk. Licensed premises will be targeted during the operation.

# Significant history now officially unveiled

New signage at the historic Aboriginal graves in Murchison has been officially unveiled clarifying who lies in which grave and correcting errors regarding dates of death.

It has been a long-term project to have the information accurately recorded. Support from the descendants of Tattambo, leader of the Ngurai-illum Wurrung clan original custodians of the Murchison district, City of Greater Shepparton, Murchison Cemetery Trust with Murchison Historical Society coordinating several aspects of what was needed, now means the story about these graves is clear and reflects the truth.

Tattambo died in 1868 but this has been recorded in history books and other records as several other dates - even on a boomerang attached to the grave. The official Register of Deaths shows he passed away on 1 January 1868 and this is now noted on signage at the grave and near the cemetery gate as well as the boomerang attached to the fencing surrounding the grave. Tattambo was highly respected by the Murchison community as demonstrated by the people of the town carrying out his wishes 'to be buried in a box like a

white-man'. Prominent members of the town acted as pall bearers at the funeral and raised funds to erect an iron fence surrounding the grave which is still in place.

Tattambo's son, known as Captain John (because he was at one time a Police Tracker) died in 1874 and had requested to be buried next to his father in the Murchison Cemetery. The day of Captain John's funeral, Tattambo's wife Mary died and so Tattambo's grave was opened and Mary was buried there. Some years ago, a cemetery wide project placed white crosses at graves that did not have a plaque attached to explain who was buried where and by mistake. Mary was thought to be buried with Captain John and so a white cross with her name on it incorrectly indicated at that time, her last resting place. The new sign beside these important graves now clearly explains who lies in which grave.

The unveiling of the new signage took place on the 16 November this year with many of

It is wonderful to have all the correct details relating to these significant and rare historic graves of local indigenous people, the original occupants of the district, now available for the public to read when visiting the Tattambo family graves. It took a long time to negotiate the necessary requirements and authority to alter something attached to a grave, namely the boomerang and to acquire funding. Fortunately, all parties involved were cooperative and the project initiated by the Murchison and District Historical Society came to a very satisfactory conclusion.

It has been an exercise that demonstrates the need to consult primary and accurate official sources for historic details instead of third hand accounts, so the truth is known.

# Waranga Rail Trail first stage nears completion

The much anticipated 1km asphalt section of the Waranga Rail Trail is on track to be opened this week.

The new 2.5m wide asphalt path begins at the High Street footpath in Rushworth, passes alongside the historic goods shed and railway lines, and concludes at the Bendigo-Murchison Road.

The installation of the asphalt layer was completed last Friday, and this week will see the addition of line marking, signage, bollards, and fencing. These works will mark the completion of the first stage of construction for the Waranga Rail Trail.

Construction of the

second stage of the Waranga Rail Trail is progressing well. A significant portion of the 10km gravel path, extending from the Bendigo-Murchison Road crossing to Channel Inlet Road, has been installed. However, table drains and shoulder works are still Additionally, required. repairs to six VicTrack bridges are currently underway.

This section of the Waranga Rail Trail will remain closed to the public until construction is

completed.

Construction fencing and flagging have been installed at all bridges and road access points. Council has asked the public to stay off this path over the Christmas break and into the new year while the contractor, Northerns Constructions Group, completes the finishing touches to the new Rail Trail.

On the 10th Day of Christmas, we were drinking homemade brew. As if that wasn't bad enough . . we were eating turkey stew.

*On the 11th Day of Christmas*, the Christmas tree was moulting. With chilli, soy and oyster sauce, the turkey was revolting.

On the 12th Day of Christmas, we had smiles upon our lips. The guests had gone, the turkey too. We dined on fish and chips.



#### Garden ornaments

One of the most polarizing garden things is the use of garden ornaments. Much comes down to personal taste and we do have the freedom to do whatever we want with our gardens (as long as it is legal). So, with people being so very different, so are the garden ornaments that people place in their gardens.

Some garden ornaments were originally functional. An example of this are the stone lanterns found in Japanese gardens. They were needed to light the way around gardens at night. Originally, they contained a lighted candle and their 'windows' were covered with translucent paper. Other ornaments are made from repurposed functional objects. In England, stone 'mushrooms' are often seen in gardens. These are the stone stumps that once supported granaries. In Australia all kinds of old things are repurposed as garden ornaments: anything from old single furrow ploughs to complete MacKay headers, even old windmills. Some ornaments actually have a function. Birdbaths, bird feeders, and bee hotels are all examples of functional garden ornaments. Ornamental pots also provide interest.

There is a huge range of concrete ornaments. Most look better if they look as if they have a bit of age to them. The trick is to smother new concrete ornaments with natural yoghurt and keep them in a cool shady place for a while. This will promote the growth of moss and lichen. This trick also works on terracotta.

The polarizing thing about garden ornaments is that many are not exactly..... tasteful. Really, there are many garden ornaments that leave me scratching my head and wondering what sort of person designed them and why does anyone even buy them for their garden? But people do make them and people do buy them. Do we really want a mooning gnome in our garden?

Garden ornaments are a great way to add a feature or focal point to a garden. The trick is not to overdo it. Being the Zen Gardener, my mantra is less is more. A few modestly sized, well designed and made ornaments that do not dominate the garden work best for my aesthetic senses.

Try to avoid cliches like model windmills (Dutch or Australian), or real windmills for that matter. The same goes for gnomes and all forms of animal and bird monstrosities. At least in Rushworth we don't need kangaroo ornaments. We get the real thing.

The trouble is I tend to acquire garden ornaments. Some I make myself as sculptures, some I buy because they are so bad that they are good. Others are gifts that I really cannot hide or give away. My solution to this plethora of ornaments was to create a 'kitsch garden' in a corner that is quite shaded and difficult to grow much in.

Perhaps the best garden ornaments are the living ones: a shrub with interesting foliage, a tree with an interesting shape, not to mention the birds and other creatures that visit the garden. As for those gnomes, send them with a one-way ticket up to Canberra to Floriade! **The Zen Gardener**

# More disaster on local roads to close 1974

A road smash between Stanhope and Rushworth near the Woolwash swamp took the life of Deborah McKindlay of Moama, adding to an awful district road toll in the second half of 1974.

#### Schools

As the school year neared closure, a dressup day at Rushworth Primary was embraced by teachers as much as students. A grainy photo showed Mrs Mackinder in jolly mood and lively costume.

#### Personal

Geoff and Lorna Britton, who had operated the milk bar now known as Gus and Ollie's, and then had roles at the Criterion Hotel, prepared to move to manage the Hotel Elizabeth, in Elizabeth Street, Melbourne. (*Big change from the bright lights of Rushworth.*)

Arthur and Joan Harradence were licensees of the Criterion Hotel and advertised "good beer, good food and good accomodation", (*but bad spelling of accommodation*).

#### Football

Summer or not, the talk was still about football, and the threat of 1974 premier Tooborac to quit the Heathcote League if a limit was imposed on the club's ability to field ex-radius players. Apparently few locals were available or interested to play footy. The nearby Pyalong area had just as few men or boys willing or able to pull on the boots for Tooborac.

#### Cricket

In B-grade cricket, Ted Shanks (4/23), Stephen Teasdale (3/33), Roger Barnes (2/7) and Lurch Hoyling (1/3) dismissed Tatura for just 70 runs, in reply to Rushworth's 133. The Rushworth lads hung on to eight sharp catches.

In the next match Girgarre made 71 runs and Rushworth replied with 70. Batting again, Girgarre did a little better, getting 89. To win outright Rushworth needed 91 runs in 45 minutes. Ross Williams teed off with quick-fire 54, but the match was only a first innings result as Rushworth finished on 4/80.

A-grade was well behind on the first innings and faced the possibility of outright defeat against Kyabram Red, but compiled 5/180 to force a draw. Veteran Graeme Johansen scored 75, Trevor Hawking 30 and Alan Mee 20. In the following match Rushworth's 91 was well short of Cooma's score of 179. Alan Mee got 4/74, John Raglus 3/39.

#### Tennis

Rushworth B-grade selected to play Harston Gold were Ross Burge, Rob Raglus, Colin Barlow, Mark Mackinder, Pauline Wootton, Julie Pearce, Judy Meagher and Yvonne Laurie.

C-grade sent out veterans Peter Davidson and Tom Harrop with Gerard McArdle, Geoff Burge, Miriam Poulson, Susan Barber, Jenny Hoyling and Meredith Heily, before the Christmas break. Matches were to resume in mid-January.

#### Season's greetings in 1974

Chronicle proprietor Peter Davidson extended season's greetings to readers, on behalf of himself and office assistant Sharon Jones. (Sharon is now Sharon Perry and her fine photos today would have greatly lifted the 1974 newspaper!)

#### Another tragedy

19 December, 1974, brought the darkest day in the life of our family. My mother Lorna lost her life in a collision at the notorious Midland Highway – McEwen Road intersection. This left our father Duncan hospitalised for three days and sister Isabel with a broken arm. She was just fourteen, and Barbara just eleven, the three boys being a little older, me the eldest on nineteen. It is fifty years ago, but we will obviously never forget that day, or the pre-Christmas funeral conducted by a minister who, unfortunately, had never met our mother.

The road toll across the district had been truly shocking in 1974, with a well-known Stanhope family about to be shattered early in 1975.

Another 50-year anniversary looming up is the Christmas Day 1974 destruction of Darwin by Cyclone Tracy. Anyone aged over about 65 now will remember where they were when that equally shocking news began to trickle out on Christmas Day and Boxing Day, after only the most basic communication contact was re-established with Darwin. (*Telephone lines smashed and blown away*. *Obviously no mobile phones.*)

#### **Repeat apology**

Throughout 2024 this page has been dominated by Rushworth and Colbinabbin news. I have only been able to extract content from what was published in 1974, and unfortunately there was very little news included from Stanhope and Murchison.

# Season's greetings and a suggestion





# Rushworth forest timber output

From the gold rush until late in the 20th century, the output of timber products from the Rushworth forest has been enormous. Sawmills were established as early as the 1870s as the employment offered by the gold mines continued to subside. The timber industry grew rapidly and provided employment for many local people.

The Public Records Office of Victoria (PROV) holds two "Forest Output" books covering the period from 1917 to 1942.1 During that quarter of a century, which was possibly the heyday of the local forest industries, an incredible amount of product was sourced from the forest.

#### Mining timbers

A substantial amount of timber was needed for the gold mining industry for shoring up shafts and tunnels, building infrastructure and providing the fuel to power steam driven equipment. The forest industry provided both round and split stays, as well as wooden slabs for use in the mines.

Obviously, this type of product was not in as much demand by the 20th century, apart from a spike in 1931 which might have coincided with the reopening of a mine.

#### Sawn and hewn timber

In the short period between the two world wars, over a quarter of a million super feet (one super foot = one square foot, one inch thick, or in metric -30.48 cm square x 2.54 cm thick) of sawn and hewn timber came out of the local sawmills. No reliable figures have been found for earlier periods, but sawmills had been providing that sort of product for nigh on 50 years before that.

#### **Railway sleepers**

The development of the local forest industry coincided with the rapid growth of railways throughout Victoria, and to a lesser extent the tramways in Melbourne and large regional towns like Ballarat and Bendigo. There was huge demand for box and ironbark sleepers from the Rushworth forest. In the period covered by the two Forest Output books mentioned above, the number of handhewn sleepers that came out of the Rushworth forest exceeded 633,000. One year of figures is missing from the record, so in all likelihood, the output exceeded 650,000.

An incredible fact about the sleepers is that they were all hand-hewn – not cut by powered saws. The writer was privileged to see Jack Miller, one of the last of the old sleeper cutters of the Rushworth forest, demonstrating the art at the 1978 Golden Guinea Festival in Rushworth. This was possibly the last railway sleeper hand-hewn in the district.

#### Fencing and firewood

Fencing materials – strainers, posts, stays, rails, droppers etc - constituted a large part of the output of the forest. For example, in the period covered by the Forest Output books, over 1.1 million items were produced. Supplementary products included timber for the grape and fruit growing industries.

Firewood was a major industry with a number of firewood mills being established at stations along the Murchison to Colbinabbin line. The firewood was divided into three main categories – dry, green and long (usually 5 feet) dry – with the latter being used to power boilers of local industry such as dairy factories. Overall, in excess of 400,000 tons of firewood exited the forest legally during the 25 years to 1942.

#### Poles

Another product for which there was increasing demand in the 20th century was poles for power and telegraph lines. Rushworth first had electric power in 1914, but a large number of poles were still required to extend the availability of power to rural areas of Victoria. In the period between the world wars, over 80,000 poles came out of the forest. These would be cut to the rigid specifications of the relevant government departments of the day - the SEC (State Commission, Electricity established 1918) and the PMG (Postmaster General's Department, established 1901).

#### Summary

This is just a very brief summary of the timber products that came out of the Rushworth forest over some of the time that the forest was harvested for these products. Some of the upcoming stories will provide more detail on specific products and the people that were employed in the forest in private enterprise.

Later stories will also look at the role of the Forests Commission of Victoria in this area and the people who worked for that government organisation. Contributions from readers would be most welcome.

#### Name from the Past Annie Nielsen 1924 - Wife of Whroo grocer died at Girgarre

Almost 101 years ago, Mrs Annie Nielsen died on Christmas eve, and was buried on Boxing Day. A true pioneer, she had a most interesting life, spent in part at Whroo, Rushworth and Girgarre, and was the mother of eight children. Her story was told in the Rushworth Chronicle of 4 January, 1924, but fails to include her maiden name.

"NIELSEN. --- At the residence of her daughter, Mrs. N. H. Moller, Girgarre, Annie Marie, wife of the late Neil Nielsen, late of Whroo and Rushworth, and loving mother of Annie (Mrs. N. H. Moller), Andrew, Jack, Peter, Mary (Mrs. Thomson), Neil, Katie (Mrs Gould) and Minnie. Aged 70 years. Deeply Regretted.

We regret to have to report the death of another old and respected resident and pioneer of the Rushworth district, in the person of Mrs. A. Nielsen, relict of the late Mr. Neil Nielsen, of Whroo, who passed away at the residence of her daughter (Mrs. N. H. Moller, Girgarre) on Monday, 24th December.

The deceased had been ill for about twelve months.

The late Mrs Nielsen, who was 70 years of age at the time of her death, was born in Frankfurt, Germany, and arrived in Victoria in 1856, at the age of three years. She resided on the Bendigo goldfields until 1882, when Mr. Nielsen came to Rushworth, where he was manager of the Crown and Cross and Clousen's mines for about five years.

Mrs Nielsen then went to reside at Whroo, where her husband opened a grocery store.

After her husband's death, which took place at Whroo, Mrs Neilsen went to Werribee to reside, and afterwards resided for a time at Seymour. She afterwards came to Rushworth, where she resided for some time.

Her health not being good she gave up housekeeping and went to reside with her daughter (Mrs Moller), at Girgarre, where she died, as stated.

The late Mrs Nielsen leaves a family of four sons and four daughters, three of the family having pre-deceased her. The surviving members of the family being Mrs Moller (Girgarre), Andrew (Rushworth), Jack (Sunshine), Peter (Colbinabbin), Mrs. Thomson (Croydon), Neil (Korumburra), Mrs Gould (Wedderburn), and Minnie (Fairfield).

One of the daughters (Mrs Thomson) served through the war as a nurse, and one of her sons (Neil) also served at the front.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, 26th December, the remains being first taken to St. Paul's Church of England, Rushworth, where a short service was conducted, and afterwards to the Rushworth cemetery for interment, the Rev. F. Grist being the officiating clergyman. The funeral arrangements were carried out by Mr. E. F. Anderson."

All about wildlife

Kirsty Ramadan from Bohollow Wildlife is a wildlife rescue expert. Here she shares some of her knowledge about our very familiar wildlife neighbours.

# Reflecting on the life of a wildlife rescuer

It's hard to believe another year has rolled on by so quickly! It has been one with the obligatory mixture of highs and lows; we don't expect anything else in the wildlife rescue world.

Today has been a scorching hot day and is still 35 degrees Celsius outside on the veranda at 9.36 pm as I write. Tomorrow will be cooler at least. The day has been steady with calls, but not as busy as I expected with the heat of today. Thankfully it is only one day.

This is the time of year many people are preparing for and looking forward to a hard earned holiday. Life for as at the shelter is quite different. We recognise and celebrate like the next household...but my kids know I can be called out at any time and it's a given that this happens on Christmas Eve and Day, as well as at New Year.

Weekends for us are no different than weekdays, they can actually be busier as more people are out and about outdoors and find wildlife in trouble. For each and every one of you who stop to help and call to get assistance for wildlife, we thank you from the bottom of our hearts. You are the first on site to help and we are the 'paramedics' who tend to the patients. It is a team effort by people who care which gives our critters a second chance to get back out into their wild homes.

Although busy, it's a time I always feel at home in. The house is full of various baby birds, cheeping, chirruping, humming, although I cannot find words to describe the constant and penetrating sounds the galahs, cockatoos and corella babes make – maybe it's akin to a creaking door only times ten the volume!

Our days start early with bird feeds and calls then after the first call-out I am often out on the road until well after dark. If I'm lucky, I may get time to come home to the shelter for a short while before hitting the road again. At the end of the day, I'm exhausted. There are nights I fall asleep with my boots on because an intended powernap has turned into a necessary sleep.

Sometimes I ponder what life may look like if wildlife rescue was not my life; it is difficult to even imagine. In that moment when I begin to think how much easier it could make things, the flip side always comes to mind – what would become of the wildlife who need a helping hand if I stopped and they found nowhere else to get help?

It is becoming harder and harder for wildlife shelters to operate. The costs have

climbed markedly and because we are few and far between, we are all tired. If I want to be reminded of the reason I do it, I only have to think of the Tawny Frogmouth chicks and Rosella chicks now grown and preparing for release. The pelican from the fish farm being released tomorrow as his wounds are healed. The native ducks who are flying in and out from the rehab dam since being released and the ducklings in light boxes inside who will grow to join them.

I guess for me the busy season means long days, utter exhaustion and, most of all, the hope that I feel for the world when there is new life all around me.

A very special shout out to my family for putting up with shelter life and for all the work they put in tending the critters while I attend rescues and pick ups, it would be impossible without them.

An extra loud shout out for the kind hearted support we receive in the form of donations. We couldn't keep our doors open without you all. Deb and I are always humbled by the support we receive.

I wish you all a safe and wonderful Christmas/New Year from all of us here at Bohollow. Bring on the adventures of 2025! *Kirsty*

#### ON THE BRINK by Meil Laurie Looking at endangered or extinct flora and fauna.

#### Reindeer

This Brink has a Christmas theme: reindeer. Some readers may remember an earlier Brink column about caribou. Caribou and reindeer are the same species, the main difference between them being geographic. Caribou are from Arctic North America and reindeer are from the far north of Scandinavia and Russia. Caribou are completely wild animals whereas reindeer can be wild, semi-wild or domesticated.

The caribou and reindeer populations have plummeted, largely due to the effects of global warming (about four times faster in the arctic than the rest of the world), on their habitats. They live mainly on the tundra, primarily eating lichens and shrubs. The problem is that with a warmer climate the forests are creeping north, encroaching on the tundra. Another key issue for the caribou and reindeer is during winter they dig through the powdery snow to graze. With warmer winters the snow can get slushy or rained on and then refreezes into concrete-hard icy snow which is almost impossible for the deer to dig through, leading to starvation.

The lives of the Sami of northern Scandinavia are so closely linked, culturally

and financially, to the reindeer that should the reindeer population crash, so will the Sami way of life. While there are significant herds of wild reindeer, particularly in Norway, most of the reindeer are in Sami heards.

The reindeer of the Sami and other ethnic groups in Russia provide another twist to climate change. The growth of shrubs marks the beginning of the trees invading the tundra. This 'shrubification' acts like a blanket keeping the ground and snow under the shrubs warmer, accelerating the whole process. However, it has been discovered that the Sami's reindeer can be used to fight shrubification.

The border between Norway and Finland is fenced -reindeer cannot cross into the other country. It has been noticed that on the Finish side of the border there are few shrubs and the tundra is largely intact while on the Norwegian side there are more shrubs and less tundra (it is even noticeable on Google Earth). Why?

The answer lies in differing herd management practices either side of the border. In Finland reindeer herding is more 'hands-off' with the deer left on the tundra all year while in Norway the deer are moved into enclosures to be hand fed over the winter. It was found that in Finland the reindeer were browsing on the shrubs when snow made lichen was less accessible and also trampling them in the process. The reindeer were not only stopping the spread of the forest but were also slowing down climate change. It is an example of how a simple, easy thing can have a big effect.

While the caribou and reindeer are the same species (Rangifer tarandus) there is a subspecies, Rangifer tarandus rudolphii, which is distinguishable by its red nose and is seldom seen except for late December.

### Greens Lake to close for New Year's Eve

Greens Lake at Corop will be temporarily closed over the New Year period to ensure public safety.

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) first closed the lake for the New Year's period in 2014 at the urging of emergency services following several unsafe situations that occurred at the lake. The lake has since been closed around the same time for each subsequent year.

GMW Water Delivery Services general manager Warren Blyth said continuing to close the lake was the sensible decision.

"The advice from emergency services is that we continue to close Greens Lake during the New Year's holiday period," he said.

"Doing so has effectively reduced the type of incidents that led to the closure, so it is the safest option available."

Greens Lake will be closed from 10 am on Tuesday, 31 December 2024 and reopen at 12 pm (noon) on Wednesday, 1 January 2025.

Members of the public who are camping at Greens Lake before the closure must



remove their camps before leaving the area.

"We have been closing the lake at this time for a decade now, so most potential visitors are aware that spending the New Year there is not an option

"We appreciate people's continued cooperation and wish everyone a safe and happy holiday period."


The children entertained their families with a concert, performing a number of dances for their captive audience.

The application is deficit in many ways, including fire risk, Indigenous and European heritage, damage to roads, and wrong use of prime agricultural land.

Further it is smack bang in the middle of the Heathcote Geographical Index for Viticuture which is an international index.

# **Brolga breeding success**

Rushworth Field and Game along with a local farmer are celebrating the successful hatching of a pair of young brolgas on his wetland. The brolga parents also seem quite chuffed and protective of their young chicks. The farmer has been quietly awaiting a photo opportunity,

having seen the chicks a few weeks back. Since seeing the chicks earlier, they have not been sighted which is normal until they start to develop feathers.

Although not unknown, it is also unusual to have two chicks because they only lay one egg or leave the area with the successfully hatched chick.

The farmer has been removing foxes on a regular basis for many years and, combined with fox shoots carried out by Rushworth Field and Game, this has created a safe nesting environment for brolgas in Northern Victorian wetlands.

The wetland these brolgas breed on was filled and maintained by the farmer, so it is a particularly satisfying result

Rushworth Field and Game Conservation officer Graeme Wall said there had been four successful hatchings in the local area this year which was particularly satisfying after a relatively dry winter.

Brolga numbers continue to improve in the Corop area but there are always opportunities to improve on this success with developing habitat and predator reduction

Hey Kids! Merry Christmas and happy holidays! There are so many beautiful (and delicious) fruits in season at this time of year - in this bumper edition of the Waranga

News we are taking a look at Fruit Salad ingredients. A blueberry is a berry; a very small fruit. It grows in a type of woody plant called a shrub. Many types of blueberries grow in North America and eastern Asia.



Blueberries have a sweet taste, with a little acidic hint. Wild blueberries have stronger taste a Blueberries are good jelly, for making pies, muffins iam. and other many foods. The most widely cultivated species of blueberry Vaccinium is corymbosum. Some similar kinds of berries are called

blueberry or huckleberry in different places.

A cherry is a fruit that grows on a tree or a bush. It belongs to the genus Prunus. It is red in colour, with a seed in the middle. It tastes slightly sour and is often used to flavour cakes and ice cream, or is baked in a pie or cobbler. Cherries are also a good source of Vitamin B.

Kiwifruit (Actinidia deliciosa) is a fruit. It has an oval shape. It is green on the inside with small black seeds that can be eaten. The kiwi has furry brown skin that is edible but is usually removed. The skin is relatively thin.

The kiwi is native to South China and China produced 50% of the world total of kiwifruit in 2017.

The fruit was named in 1959 after the kiwi, a bird and the symbol of New Zealand. Before that, its English name was Chinese gooseberry.

The kiwifruit is healthy and contains many vitamins and minerals. Kiwis are rich in vitamin C, vitamin K, potassium, and fibre. Kiwis have more vitamin C than an equivalent amount of orange.

The fruit of a strawberry (Fragoria ananassa) is rose when ripe, and has edible seeds on the outside. Many people eat strawberries on ice cream or dip them in sugar. Strawberries are rich in vitamin C and manganese. Many strawberries are grown on strawberry farms and the farmers often have hives of bees that live on the farm to pollinate the strawberries. Strawberries are technically aggregate fruits, containing more than one fruit. Strawberry stems are called runners. They grow above ground. They are a type of stolon. Seeds (the achenes) are the true fruit.

A raspberry is an aggregate fruit, meaning it has many parts joined together. It is similar to a blackberry but the fruit is hollow on the inside. There are many different species of raspberry plants, but only a few of them have fruit that are sold in grocers. Leaves of the raspberry plant are also used fresh or dried in herbal teas. The raspberry is red when ripe, and is also a source of nectar for juices.

The blackberry is an edible fruit made by any of several species in the Rubusgenus of the Rosaceae family. The blackberry shrub is called "bramble" in Britain, but in the western U.S. "caneberry" is the term used for both blackberries and raspberries.

It is a widespread and well known group of over 375 species which reproduce by apomixis. They are native all over the temperate northern hemisphere and South America. The blackberry grows to about 3 m in height. It makes an edible black fruit known by the same name. The plant tolerates poor soil very well.

Grapes are the fruit of a woody grape vine. Grapes can be eaten raw, or used for making wine, juice, and jelly/jam. Grapes come in different colours; red, purple, white and green are some examples. Today, grapes can be seedless, by using machines to pit the fruit.

Wild grapevines often considered nuisance weed, as they cover other plants with their usually rather aggressive growth.

A plum is a sweet fruit that grows on a plum tree. The scientific name for the tree is Prunus domestica. When the fruit is dried, it is called a prune. The color "plum" takes its name from the fruit.

Prunus domestica is the European plum. Most of the plums we eat are grown on varieties of this tree. Greengages and damsons are varieties of plum.

The peach (Prunus persica) is a deciduous tree native to the region of Northwest China between the Tarim Basin and the north slopes of the Kunlun Mountains, where it was first domesticated and cultivated. It bears an edible juicy fruit called a peach or a nectarine.

The specific name persica refers to its widespread cultivation in Persia (modern-day Iran), from where it was transplanted to Europe. It belongs to the genus Prunus which includes the cherry, apricot, almond and plum, in the rose family. The peach is classified with the almond in the subgenus Amygdalus, distinguished from the other subgenera by the corrugated seed shell. Due to their close relatedness, the inside of a peach stone tastes remarkably similar to almond, and peach stones are often used to make a cheap version of marzipan, known as persipan.

The pineapple was brought to northern Europe by the Dutch from their colony in Surinam. The first pineapple to be successfully cultivated in Europe, is said to have been grown by Pieter de la Court at Meerburg in 1658.

A banana is the common name for a type of fruit and also the name for the herbaceous plants that grow it. These plants belong to the genus Musa. They are native to the tropical region of southeast Asia.

It is thought that bananas were grown for food for the first time in Papua New Guinea. Today, they are cultivated in tropical regions around the world. Most banana plants are grown for their fruits, which botanically are a type of berry. Some are grown as ornamental plants, or for their fibres.

#### TV Mass lives on

Australia's longest-running religious television program, Mass for You at Home, will continue its ministry into 2025.

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and the Diocese of Wollongong have signed an agreement to continue producing and broadcasting the program, which first aired on Australian television in 1971.

Mass for You at Home will be broadcast every Sunday at 6 am on the Ten Network and multiple times during the week on Foxtel's Aurora (Channel 173).

Wollongong Bishop Brian Mascord said he was delighted Mass for You at Home would continue in 2025 and emphasised the importance of the program in providing a spiritual lifeline to those unable to attend Mass in person.

"For 54 years, Mass for You at Home has been a vital link to the source and summit of the Christian life for those who are unable to attend in person, including parishioners in prisons, nursing homes and those who are sick or housebound," Bishop Mascord said.

An important part of the program is Auslan interpretation for the deaf community, which will continue in 2025.

Bishop Mascord expressed heartfelt gratitude for the outpouring of support from viewers, dioceses, religious orders, and sponsors – including major sponsor Catholic Mission – which enabled the program to continue.

"I have been deeply moved by the prayers and generous financial support of the Mass for You at Home community," Bishop Mascord said.

"The outpouring of support gave me cause to discern what the Spirit is asking of us at this time."

## 2024 Christmas Messages from Leaders of Christian Churches

Christmas messages from the Australian leaders of fifteen Christian denominations have been published by the National Council of Churches. The messages are prefaced by the following statement from NCCA President, Reverend John Gilmore:

Love is born With a dark and troubled face When hope is dead And in the most unlikely place Love is born Love is always born (Michael Leunig)

This poem written by Michael Leunig captures something of the mystery of the birth of Christ celebrated at Christmas. The social reality of the time of Jesus' birth was one of military occupation, and it was an environment of violence with little justice or compassion. This is seen in the decision of Herod to kill first born infants, and the resulting need for the Holy Family to seek asylum in Egypt.

There are parallels with our global environment. What is very different, though, is the ease with which we have all this darkness, trouble and hopelessness presented to us on a daily basis. Media giants thrive on doing this and we can experience hopelessness. To see, become aware of, and point to love being born takes a different sense of insight and awareness. The Christmas story describes how Mary and Joseph knew love was being born. The shepherds knew this, and the travellers from the East also knew. In a humble setting in Bethlehem, not in a place of power, in a feeding trough love was born.

Love continues to be born in kindness, forgiveness, compassion, peace, and justice. These are among the signs of the continuing presence of Jesus in and around us. In small ways as we nurture the signs of the presence of Jesus, no matter how small they may be, love is born, and it grows.

May you in this Christmas season, wherever you are, and in whatever circumstances you find yourself in, see and experience the ongoing birth of love.

# living the **GOOD LIFE**

My brother Noel died last week. He would have turned 74 on Christmas Eve. Despite being only three years older than me, he had been living with early dementia in a nursing home.

My family of origin has never been particularly expressive. We're not big talkers. We are not inclined to share our feelings. For many years, we only met at Christmastime or for occasional, brief visits. Yet for the first sixteen years of my life, Noel and I shared a bedroom. Proximity has a way of creating a certain closeness, even if words are often unspoken.

Noel's death has evoked a mixture of emotions in me. Sadness, but also quiet gratitude for the rhythms of childhood: the simple, everyday experiences that create bonds that outlast the ravages of distance or time.

After Noel died, his wife shared a tender story with me. She had spent the day keeping vigil at Noel's bedside. As evening approached and she prepared to leave, Noel opened his eyes for the first time that day. She leaned in, kissed him on the lips, and to her surprise, he kissed her back. (After his dementia developed, he normally didn't.) Just five minutes later, Noel took his last breath.

This moment, full of both joy and sorrow, reminded me of Brené Brown's description of joy as arising from connection, gratitude, and purpose. Joy, I realised, can co-exist with sorrow, offering a sense of meaning and hope even in the saddest of times.

The death of Noel has also prompted me to reflect on my own health. Last week, I had a colonoscopy, and the surgeon found five polyps. They've been sent off for a biopsy. While I'm optimistic, waiting for the result compels me to confront uncertainty and my mortality.

The four Sundays before Christmas mark the start of the Christian year. It is called Advent. Advent is a season of waiting and preparing for Jesus' coming. Each week we reflect on a different value: hope, courage, joy, and love. These values make an interesting lens for making sense of grief, uncertainty, and mortality.

Grief is such a deeply personal thing, and I've come to realise there's no one "right" way to process it. Each loss I've faced has been different. As a child, I grieved the deaths of pets and grandparents. Later in life, my grief was for my parents, the heartbreak of a broken marriage, and the pain of unwanted career changes. More recently, it's been the deaths of two brothers. Through it all, I've found myself wondering if I'm grieving the "right" way. Am I feeling the sadness I'm supposed to feel? Am I failing to articulate what I believe about the afterlife?

I've come to realise that grief doesn't

Noël, Noël, Noël, grieving Noel

Sometimes, I feel a numbness or quietness when I think I should feel more. Other times, unexpected emotions rise up-anger, guilt, even moments of joy- reminding me how complicated grief can be.

The way I grieve my brothers feels different from how I grieved my parents, and I'm beginning to accept that this difference is okay.

When it comes to the afterlife, I feel uncertain. I don't always know what to believe or how to put it into words. As someone steeped in Christian tradition, I encounter so many different perspectives, from biblical promises to deeply personal and symbolic ideas.

For me, the afterlife feels more like an openended mystery. Perhaps it's not about visualising the specifics but trusting that love endures in some way I can't yet fully understand. Yes, my brothers live on in the memories I carry, in the ways they've shaped me, and in the love that still connects us, but I also trust that they live on in the embrace of God.

Grief, I've realised, isn't linear. It ebbs and flows. Some losses feel more "resolved" over time, while others remain tender. Sometimes a new loss even re-awakens the pain of earlier ones. But I'm trying to give myself permission to grieve in my own way, without judging whether I'm "doing it right."

I've found a few things helpful as I navigate this journey. First, I try to accept the ambiguity. There's no perfect way to feel or respond to loss, and it's okay if my grief looks different than I expect. Second, talking or writing about my memories, my brothers, or even my uncertainty about the afterlife helps me process those emotions.

Third, I've found comfort in honouring the relationships I've lost through rituals or moments of reflection.

And finally, I return to my faith, not looking for fixed answers but for reminders of hope and resurrection. The themes of Advent: hope, courage, joy and love remind me that loss doesn't have the final word.

As I reflect on this season of Advent, I'm reminded that waiting is a central part of faith. Advent invites us into the "not yet," a time of hope and expectation. In this waiting, I'm reminded that what matters most in life is not the material things that fade, but the enduring qualities of the spirit—hope, courage, joy, and peace. And in this waiting, we are never alone. This is the promise of Christmas: You shall call him Emmanuel—God with us. Even in our grief, in our uncertainties, and in the quiet moments of life, God is present, walking with us, holding us, and bringing light to our darkness.

So, as we wait for Christmas, I wish you moments of stillness, hope in the face of uncertainty, courage to meet the challenges of life, joy that surprises you, and peace that settles deeply within. May the light of this Season of Advent fill your heart and your home. Merry Christmas!

This is the gospel, and it's good news!



GVEC is an inclusive club who welcomes all people to join from beginners to Advanced Dressage riders. Everyone is respectfully treated.




